
Gail and I are wishing you and yours a safe and healthy summer, and we are looking forward to the reunion and seeing you there.

CHALLENGE COIN HISTORY

During WW 1, American volunteers from all parts of the country filled the newly formed flying squadrons in Europe. Some were wealthy scions attending colleges such as Yale & Harvard who quit mid-term to join the war. In one squadron, a wealthy lieutenant ordered medallions struck in solid bronze and presented them to his unit. One young pilot placed the medallion in a small leather pouch that he wore around his neck.

Shortly after acquiring the medallions, the pilot's aircraft was severely damaged by ground fire. He was forced to land behind enemy lines and was immediately captured by a German patrol. In order to discourage his escape, the Germans took all of his personal identification except for the small leather pouch around his neck. In the meantime, he was taken to a small French town near the front. Taking advantage of a bombardment that night he escaped. However, he was without personal identification.

He succeeded in avoiding German patrols by donning civilian attire and reached the front lines. With great difficulty, he crossed into no-man's land. Eventually, he stumbled onto a French outpost. Unfortunately, saboteurs had plagued the French in the sector. They sometimes masqueraded as civilians and wore civilian clothes. Not recognizing the young pilots American accent, the French thought him to be a saboteur and made ready to execute him. He had no identification to prove his allegiance, but he did have his leather pouch containing the medallion. He showed the medallion to his would-be executioners and one of his French captors recognized the squadron insignia on the medallion. They delayed his execution long enough for him to confirm his identity. Instead of shooting him they gave him a bottle of wine.

Back at his squadron, it became a tradition to ensure that all members carried their medallion or coin at all times. This was accomplished through challenge in the following manner—a challenger would ask to see the medallion. If the challenged could not produce the coin, they were required to buy a drink of choice for the member who challenged them. If the challenged member produced a medallion, then the challenging member was required to pay for the drink. This tradition continued on throughout the war and for many years after the war while surviving members of the squadron were still alive.

Challenge Coin Rules

- 1. Rules of the coin game must be given or explained to all new coin holders.
- 2. The coin MUST be carried at all times. You can be challenged for it anywhere, at any-time. You must produce the coin without taking more than four (4) steps to produce it.
- 3. When challenging, the challenger must state whether it is for a single drink or a round of drinks.
- 4. Failure to produce a coin, for what ever reason, results in a bought round or single drinks ,whatever the challenger stated. Once the coinless challenge has bought the drinks or round, they cannot be challenged again.
- 5. If all that are challenged produce their coins, the challenger loses and must buy the drinks for all respondents.
- 6. Under no circumstances can a coin be handed to another in response to a challenge. If a person gives their coin to another, that person can now keep the coin-it's theirs!!! However if a person puts their coin down for another to examine, it is not considered giving and the examiner is honored bound to place the coin back where they got it. The examiner can't challenge while they hold another's coin. The examiner must return the coin!
- 7. If a coin is lost, replacement is up to the individual. A new coin should be acquired at the earliest opportunity-losing a coin and not replacing it doesn't relieve a member of his or her responsibilities.
- 8. There are no exception to the rules. They applied to clothed or un-clothed. One step and an arms reach are allowed.
- 9. A coin is a coin. Coins worn in a holder around the neck are valid.
- 10. The coin should be controlled at all times. It is an honor to be given a coin, let's keep it that way. A given or awarded coin is of more personal value than a purchased coin.
- 11. No holes may be drilled in a coin.
- 12. The above rules apply to anyone who is worthy to be given/awarded a coin, has a purchased coin or is known to be a previous coin holder.

Please note that on the registration page, the reunion banquet does not show prices for the meals. The board of directors have voted to provide the meal at no charge to attendees.

Hotel Accommodations are at

Crown Plaza Charleston Airport Convention Center 4831 Tanger Outlet Boulevard, North Charleston, SC 29418

The hotel has given the Jouett Association a reduced rate of \$132.00 (plus taxes) per night. This rate will be honored for 3 days prior to and 3 day after the reunion dates. Reservations will be made by the individual attendees by calling 1-843-744-4422 and using the Group Code of **USS Jouett**. Reservations can also be made by going on line at "cmorey@charlestoncp.com". The room rates also include a continental breakfast for the attendees for each day of stay.

The banquet is scheduled for Sunday evening this year in order to accommodate the busyness of the hotel. The hotel does not normally include continental breakfast in their room rates. However, because we elected to host the banquet on Sunday, the hotel will include a continental breakfast for the attendees that are staying at the facility each day that we are there.

Registration will begin in the Hospitality Room at approx. 1100 hours on Thursday October 14, 2021 There will be a "Wine & Cheese" reception in the evening of Registration. Since it is against the by-laws of the Association to purchase alcohol, a monetary donation to offset the cost will be accepted or you can bring your own to share with the group.

Friday October 15th we will depart the hotel at approx. 0930.

We will first proceed to Patriots Point in Mount Pleasant. There we will gather for a boat ride to Fort Sumter. History is relived here as this is where the Civil War began on April 12, 1861. During a 40 minute ride out to the harbor, one will see spectacular views of Charleston's famous battery with its antebellum mansions, the Ravenel Bridge, maybe a pod of dolphins and more. While at the fort one can listen to a park ranger narrating the Battle of Fort Sumter or you can take a self-guided tour on your own. The approx. time to tour the fort will be 60 minutes. There is a small gift shop but no food allowed but drinks can be purchased on site.

From there we will go back to Patriots Point where we will board the USS Yorktown for lunch. (lunch will be on your own). There is a Sticky Fingers in the hanger bay. After lunch one may take a self-guided tour. Points of interest include the Medal of Honor Museum, dozens of historic aircraft on both the hanger bay and the flight deck. There is a flight simulator and Apollo 8 spacecraft.

Lots of ladders to climb. Recommend that the ladies wear slacks or jeans and comfortable shoes. On the surrounding grounds is an exhibit called the Vietnam Experience. Quite interesting and somewhat eerily displayed.

Also tied up to the pier is the destroyer USS Laffey (DD 724). She is of WW2 vintage and nicknamed "The Ship That Wouldn't Die". She was hit several times in kamikaze attacks. There is also a post WW2 diesel sub tied up there. The USS Clamagore (SS 343) is a maybe/maybe not. Her fate is currently being determined. Sometime between 1500 (3pm) and 1600 (4PM) we will gather for the trip back to the hotel. During our visit to the USS Yorktown we will be casting a wreath into the water in honor of and in memory of our shipmates that have passed.

<u>Saturday October 16th</u> The bus will pick us up at 0900. We will travel east down I-26 to Charleston proper. Today will all be self-guided. From the old slave market (a must see) to carriage tours to pedicabs to Charleston's world friendly restaurant and bars. There will be no shortage of sights, sounds and smells. One may take a Pedicab (Usually \$12 per couple) to the battery or a carriage ride (usually \$28 per person. Be advised the Pedicab tour only last 10 minutes. The carriage ride lasts for approx. 1 hour. The carriage operators are well versed in Charleston's history and folklore. If you should decide to do a walking tour of the city comfortable shoes are a must. The weather in mid-October in Charleston is probably the best that the city can offer. We will re-board the bus at approx. 1600 hours to return to the hotel. All meals will be on your own. There are many restaurants and bars in downtown for the noon meal and the hotel is located next to a very large Tangers Outlet Mall with many choices for dining nearby.

Sunday October 17th will be a free day with the business meeting being held in the Hospitality Room at approx. 1300 hours.

The Ladies Tea will be held outdoors in the hotel restaurant at approx. 1300 hours.

The banquet will be held at 1800 hours (6 PM)

Monday October 19th. Check out time is 11:00 AM
