NARRATIVE

- 1. Overhaul. JOUETT was the first cruiser to complete a new Threat Upgrade overhaul on schedule, a feat that remains unmatched by follow-on ships. This unique success is the direct result of early, hard work by the men of the crew. Their long hours were eventually repaid by a less-compressed post-overhaul schedule than ships often experience, which allowed time for port visits to Portland and San Francisco, and one scheduled to Vancouver, British Columbia, in 1990.
- 2. <u>CSSQT</u>. JOUETT's "New Threat Upgrade" combat system underwent post-installation testing during CSSQT. Owing to the ranges involved in SM2 (ER) missile firings, it is necessary to do CSSQT in Hawaiian waters vice on the Point Mugu range. The CSSQT tests went superbly, and afforded the crew liberty in Honolulu, especially well deserved after the drudgery of the overhaul in Long Beach. Crew proficiency reaped large dividends during CSSQT's extensive underway periods, which included four successful missile firings.
- 3. Law Enforcement Operations. U.S. Coast Guard Tactical Law Enforcement Team, Detachment TWO, embarked in San Francisco on 13 October. No contraband was found on any vessel boarded. Patrolling in SOCAL and off Baja California is very much like looking for a needle in a haystack, owing to the large number of legitimate fishing and pleasure craft and to the absence of transit choke points as they exist in the Caribbean. JOUETT accomplished two "firsts" during this operation: 1) JOUETT air controller took positive control of Customer Service reconnaissance aircraft and executed ocean surveillance plans, and 2) JOUETT conducted the first surveillance of Baja California airspace, conducting data link operations with a U.S. Air Force E-3A (AWACS) aircraft and a USAF ground site at March AFB. The ground site then relayed the air picture of the combined surveillance area to the Customer Service.
- 4. Rescue of M/V Explorer Burn Victims. On 19 October, COMCOGARD ELEVEN, in Long Beach, initiated a SAR action to rescue three burn victims from the Greek motor vessel Explorer, located some 200 miles southeast of JOUETT's position off Baja California. Two Air Force enlisted paramedics were dropped into the water by a Sacramento-based Coast Guard C-130. They pronounced one victim dead after being recovered by Explorer's lifeboat. JOUETT arrived on the scene about two hours later, and the two surviving victims and paramedics were transferred by Explorer's boat. JOUETT's hospital corpsman rendered additional aid by wrapping the victims in water-gel packs. JOUETT proceeded north, and was met by an HH-3 helicopter from the California Air National Guards' 129th Air Rescue and Recovery Group, which, accompanied by its KC-130 tanker, had flown non-stop from their base at NAS Moffett Field. The HH-3 took the burn victims aboard, but had room only for one paramedic. The remaining paramedic was transported to San Diego by a USCG HH-52.
- 5. <u>NEY Award Competition</u>. JOUETT's enlisted messdecks was completely refurbished during overhaul. This was accomplished exclusively by the ingenuity and dedication of the Supply Department, as no funds were authorized from the overhaul budget. Our messdecks have been the talk of the waterfront, and have been visited by personnel from several other ships looking for good ideas. The pleasant environment of the messdecks, combined with superb effort and dedication to quality food service by the ship's cooks, enabled JOUETT to win the honor of "most improved mess" from the type commander, COMNAVSURFPAC. JOUETT was the only "old" ship to win any prize - all other award winning ships were less than three years old.
