NARRATIVE

In January 1990 JOUETT started REFTRA and established her reputation in all areas. All major equipments were excerised, each met with success.

JOUETT shows performance in all areas including Law Enforcement operations, using the NTU (New Threat Upgrade) system to assist in the tracking and identification of numerous air and surface contacts near the U.S. - Mexico border. Additionally JOUETT accomplished the first-ever close air control of Customs Service aircraft to visually identify surface contacts and established the first ever link with an AWACS aircraft and the Customs Service ashore in support of Law Enforcement Opertaions.

Special CNO/OPS Nanoose project operations won JOUETT the appreciation and recognition of the Chief of Naval Operations for efforts in testing specialized torpedoes. JOUETT's installed ASW equipment performed flawlessly after being inspected and meeting the highest material readiness criteria, in support of four experimental torpedo firings.

Following extensive battle group restructuring and having her deployment date moved up two months, JOUETT prepared for RIMPAC

90-3B again demonstrating flexibility by adapting to new assignments and fitting into a new team. By design a very demanding evolution for the entire crew, RIMPAC afforded JOUETT the opportunity to conduct multi-dimensional warfare exercises in company with elements of Battle Groups Delta and Sierra, B-52 aircraft from Castle Air Force Base, E-3A AWACS, Orion maritime patrol aircraft, Los Angeles class submarines, and ships from Japan, Korea, Australia, and Canada. JOUETT upheld the highest standards of performance and teamwork with the international players involved, and supported the goals of the battle group as alternate AAWC and local AAWC for the Amphibious Task Group.

RIMPAC involved numerous long-range, open-ocean AAWEXs which fully utilized the capabilities of USS INDEPENDENCE, CWW-14, ANTIETAM, USS COLDSBOROUGH and JOUETT, in addition to several DDGs and FFGs from Australia and Japan. JOUETT played a critical role in polishing the Anti-Air Warfare capabilities of Sattle Group DELTA; her standard setting performance as Silent Sam ship proved especially effective. Working in conjunction with USS ANTIETAM and the E-2Cs of VAW-113 ("Black Eagles"), JOUETT trolled the outer air battle from her position as picket/silent Sam. With the Terrier missle's range and unpreceabilities, JOUETT splashed each element of every B-52/P-3C/attack aircraft raid in the ship's sector before they could INDEPENDENCE to within weapons release range. close USS several exercises JOUETT assumed duties as AAWC, utilizing command and Control capabilities of the NTU advanced Combat Direction System (with invaluable support from the opintel sysdirect all AAW assets in the attainment of maximum tems) to success.

JOUETT successfully fired one SM-2 (ER) BLK II and one SM-1 (ER) BLK V at the same presentation, in a shoot-look-shoot scenario. This unique, dual-salvo, dissimilar missile engagement required exceptional coordination between all NTU subsystem operators, on a two-day, multi-national missile firing exercise conducted in the Southern Hawaiian area.

JOUETT finally deployed on a Western Pacific on 20 June 1990 with Battle Group DELTA, CASREP free from San Diego, anticipating a challenging WESTPAC full of port visits and international exercises in support of the United States' diplomatic interest abroad. The first milestone was the Battle Group Evaluation, which required the Battle Group's and JOUETT's utmost efforts to deploy the skills developed during pre-deployment workups and RIMPAC. JOUETT excelled in all areas, integrating her extensive combat systems capabilities with those of the rest of the Battle Group to form an unbeatable multi-mission area team. BGE climaxed with the heaviest sustained bomber raid Battle Group Delta had yet seen, during which JOUETT successfully demonstrated the Remote Track Launch On Search tactic, consummation and CWW-113 "Black Eagle" E2-C aircraft.

On 2 August 1990 Iraq invaded Kuwait, and thereby changed (among other things) the mission of Battle Group DELTA. Diverted from Indian Ocean, where JOUETT was preparing to participate Weapons Week at Diego Garcia, the ships of Battle Group DELTA were ordered north. Arriving on station in the Gulf of Oman on the morning of August 6, INDEPENDENCE and escorts immediatly made their presence felt by tracking, identifying and, when necessary, intercepting all air and surface contacts transiting the Gulf of Oman and surrounding airspace for the following three months. assumed duties as the force AAWC; in this role JOUETT the the AAW actions of the ships and air assets navies of the United Kingdom, Australia, France, Italy, Canada, Spain and the Netherlands, who were aiding in the enforcement of the economic sanctions against Iraq. Whether deconflicting the daily Iranian P-3 maritime aircraft patrol missions sorting out the heavy air traffic in the area, JOUETT supplied complete and consistently reliable air coverage for INDEPENDENCE, allowing CVW 14 to carry out their cyclical Combat Air Patrol missions into the Arabian Gulf. JOJETT also participated in interception operations of surface traffic, investigationg questioning over 1000 contacts, using both shipboard assets the embarked SH-2 LAM S MK I helicopter to identify vessels entering and exiting the Gulf of Oman. Battle Group DELTA was again the object of intense media coverage when, on October escorted INDEPENDENCE through the Strait of Hormuz JOUETT into the Arabian Gulf, the first such evolution since 1974. RADM Unruh, COMCARGRU ONE, remarked, "Well done on superb escort of Indy throughout Arabian Gulf Ops. Your professionalism and good seamanship were impressive." Though in the Arabian Gulf only 48 hours, the show of force and determination told the world that the United States could and would carry out its policies at will. Despite the contraints placed on training by the stringent rekeep all systems in maximum rediness condition, quirements to JOUETT was nevertheless able to keep wathcstanders abilities honed.

During the three and one half months in the Gulf of Oman JOUETT rescued two Omani fisherman (eighteen and twelve years old) who had been adrift at sea for six days. The Defense Attache in Muscat reported that Arab press coverage was highly favorable.

JOUETT's excellence in navigation was noted throughout the competitive cycle during both open ocean transits and restricted maneuvering situations in Vancouver, Muscat, Singapore, Hong Kong, Subic Bay, and Pearl Harbor.

Battle Group DELTA was relieved on station by Battle Group ALPHA on November 2, 1990. JOUETT returned to homeport December 20, 1990, more experienced, better trained and in as good a material condition as when the ship deployed.

JOUETT's Electronic Warfare/Outboard Intelligence team has been superior in every facet. Involvement in LEO received high praise from both CJTF 5 and higher authority for the development of an

ELINT data base. During RIMPAC 90, JOUETT consistently provided initial indications and warning of Orange air and surface threats to blue warfare commanders. While deployed on WESTPAC 90, which included Battle Group Delta's rapid response to Operation Desert Shield, JOUETT remained the forefront of the Battle Groups organic intelligence collection effort. JOUETT's ability to effectively conduct fusion intelligence by effectively integrating all on board sensors in the production of intelligence reports resulted in assignment as net control afloat during Operation Desert Shield.

The command received Navy Unit Commendation ribbon, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal (second), National Defense Medal (second), and the SouthWest Asian Medal for serving during Operation Desert Shield, and also the sea service ribbon

An asset during JOUETT's deployment was the embarked SH-2 LAM S MK I helicopter which arrived on 20 June and disembarked on 20 December 1990. The helo was maintained by HSL-33 DET 9, a crew of 16, 12 enlisted and 4 pilots. The helo indentified vessels entering and exiting the Gulf of Oman and helped JOUETT track over 1000 contacts. The flight crew repeatedly demonstrated their efficiency, skill and professionalism during frequent and long VERTREP details. The coordination of the entire ship resulted in cargo being expeditiously cleared from the flight deck and stowed. The flight deck crew safely handled 970 VERTREP loads during WESTPAC 90/OPERATION DESERT SHIELD deployment.

Helo ops are an integral part of JOUETT operations at sea. The flight deck crew again proved their skill and preparedness bν manning no-notice flight quarters evolutions. The flight was always available for scheduled flight ops as well as request for DLQs and HIFRs. The 1,976 landings and 301 refuelings on JOUETT's flight deck were carried out in an extremely manner with no discrepancies. JOUETT has professional many oustanding comments from various helo squadrons on ship's facilities and services.

There are few peacetime opportunities to test the mettle of a ship and its crew that are as challenging as the deployment we

nad completed. With literally no work up as Anti-Air Warfare Commander, JOUETT enthusiastically and meticulously took on this demanding role for Battle Group Delta in the Gulf of Oman in support of Operation Desert Shield. Following a highly successful high speed transit through the North Arabian Sea, JOUETT aggresively tackled Operation Desert Shield, the largest military operation in years. In every evolution JOUETT has demonstrated the utmost in professionalism, attention to detail and "can-do spirit". The self assurance displayed by JOUETT comes from doing the job right the first time - and every time.
